Matty's Story

Matthew Martin was born February 7th, 1918 in New York City. WW I raged in Europe and the great flu epidemic was taking its toll of civilians worldwide. When Matty was five years old, he and his parents moved to their new house built on the sands of the beach of the Atlantic Ocean in Brooklyn, NY. Ocean liners and freighters sailed past his beach into and out of New York harbor teasing his imagination with the lore of the sea. Summer vacations from school Matty spent on the beach swimming, canoeing into the shipping lanes, lazing in the sands, too intense to remember to come home for lunch. His mother searched him out and brought lunch to him!




Captain's Pier, Foot of 20th Avenue, 1922

It was only natural that when WWII came along Matty enlisted in the Navy. Instead of sea duty after boot camp, he was assigned to aviation mechanics school in Jacksonville, Fl for six months followed by another six months working on airplane engines at Sand Point Naval Air Station, Seattle. While in Seattle, Matty met Joyce, a student at the University of Washington.



In March of 1944 Matty embarked on a troop ship at San Bruno, CA headed for the South Seas, landing at Los Negros Island, part of the Admiralty Islands.

Joyce had to resort to the Seattle Public Library to find a map large enough to show where Los Negros was located! There at "two degrees below the equator", he worked seven days a week readying planes for combat.



Part of the time he was sent to Biak, another small island, where he flew as flight mechanic in various patrol aircraft. At war's end he was in Guam.

Matty was discharged from the Navy October 31, 1945 on Long Island, NY and 18 days later he was in Minnesota where he and Joyce were married.



They returned to Brooklyn, NY via Denver and Washington, DC. After an intense job search he was employed as a power house electrician at the Brooklyn Navy Yard for almost a year.

A new program opened up at Floyd Bennett Naval Air Station, NY to continue the training of Reserve pilots, aviation mechanics, and other enlisted rates. "Station-keepers" were needed to run the program so Matty reenlisted in the Navy Reserve. He went back to flying as flight mechanic in various planes, but especially in the PBYs which he dearly loved.

In 1950 he voluntarily transferred to Sand Point NAS, Seattle where he spent ten years. He continued his flight status in various types of patrol aircraft. The last five years he was in charge of Air Crew Training. During this time Matty and Joyce built their house in Shoreline. Square dancing was their main recreation at this time.

In 1960 Matty was transferred to NAS Jacksonville, FL for his final three years where he continued in Air Crew Training. During this time he put Joyce through Jacksonville University using his Navy flight pay. She got her BA in mathematics, which led to her 20 years of teaching in secondary schools in Shoreline, WA. He says it was the best investment he ever made!

Three children were born to them—two in New York and one in Seattle. All are the adventuresome type. Son Richard joined the Marines and became a helicopter pilot and is at present a Seattle Fire Fighter. Daughter Carol became one of the first female Seattle Fire Fighters. Daughter Ruth became a skier, rock climber and presently is a white water kayaker.



After 20 years in the Navy Matty retired and went to work for the University of Washington for the next 17 years as a technician in the Genetics Department, maintaining all lab equipment. Weekends were spent building their cabin on a high bluff overlooking Port Susan Bay of Puget Sound. He even built a tramway in order to get from the cabin down to the beach and to his sailboat which he had also built.




Travel highlighted the next 30 years, visiting England, Italy, Switzerland, Sweden, Norway, Japan, Australia, New Zealand besides Canada, Mexico and the United States. While in Sweden Matty and Joyce visited the museum which houses the "Vasa", a manof-war, pride of the Swedish navy built during the 1600's. The "Vasa" sank on its maiden voyage and stayed submerged until 1961 when it was resurrected from its cold muddy grave. It was of particular interest as Matty had just finished a four year project of building a model of that warship. He was pleased to see that his model truly replicated every detail of the original.

Over the years Matty pursued many hobbies which included model railroading, model shipbuilding, model airplanes, photography complete with dark room, wine making, and most recently stained glass projects.

He has always been an avid reader of mostly nonfiction, preferring books of the sea and war stories besides technical material. At age nine his parents gave him a set of the Book of Knowledge encyclopedia in order to answer his many questions at the time. To this day when certain subjects are discussed Matty can denote which volume of the Book of Knowledge where he first read about them.



After both Matty and Joyce retired they moved to a new development called Harbour Pointe in Mukilteo. There they have put down new roots. Winters are spent in Arizona where Matty pursues his swimming, his hobbies and meeting new friends.

Life is good.

Edmonds Sunset

July is the seventh month of the year in the Gregorian Calendar and one of seven Gregorian months with the length of 31 days. It is, on average, the warmest month within most of the Northern hemisphere, and the coldest month within much of the Southern hemisphere. July was renamed for Julius Caesar, who was born in that month. Previously, it was called Quintilis in Latin, since it was the fifth month in the ancient Roman calendar, before January became the first month of the calendar year (the year when displayed as twelve months in order) during the time of the decemvirs about 450 BC. July starts on the same day of the week as April every year, and January in leap years. In case you wondered ♥.

"A.D." does not mean "after death," as many people suppose. "B.C." stands for the English phrase "before Christ," but "A.D." stands confusingly for a Latin phrase: *anno domini* ("in the year of the Lord"—the year Jesus was born). If the calendar actually changed with Jesus' death, then what would we do with the years during which he lived? Since Jesus was probably actually born around 6 B.C. or so, the connection of the calendar with him can be misleading.

Many Biblical scholars and historians, and archeologists prefer the less sectarian designations "before the Common Era" (B.C.E.) and "the Common Era" (C.E.).

All of these abbreviations can also be spelled without their periods.
