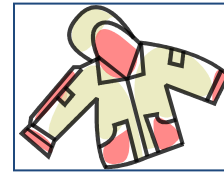

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



I drink nonfat lattes, shop for soft-shell fleece jackets at REI, and drive my son to gymnastics in our Subaru Forster. I was born in the late 70s, and it's taken me 31 years to realize something: I've lived most of my life in a "historical anomaly," a frenzied age of consumerism. "Never [in history] have so many bought so much for so little," according to Juliet Schor, author of *Plentitude*, a roaring response to the economic crisis. Schor's polemic urges us to reexamine our lifestyles and prioritize the health of our planet, our communities, and ourselves above all else. Her points about escalating consumption are hard to ignore:

- The average single family home built in the U.S. in 1980 was 1,740 ft sq. By 2000, it had expanded 45% to 2,521. 19% of new homes have 3-car or larger garages.



- One in ten houses now rents storage space, a 65% increase since 1995.



- In 1991, Americans bought an average of 31 pieces of clothing each year. By 2007, the average rose to 67 items, which means that Americans buy a new piece of clothing every 5.4 days.

Schor points out a parallel trend: to keep up with the Joneses, Americans work more than any other country in the world, except for Japan. In 1979, the year I was born, the U.S. worker averaged 1,703 hours each year. By 2006, that number had risen by 180 hours -- the equivalent of one full month of work --- to 1,883 hours annually. To what end?

I ask myself: what do I want to model for my son? When he is 10 years old, will he see a father who values time spent with others, service, and nature? Or one who needs the latest iPad or SUV? I don't know the answer. But I believe this: the more I surround myself with those who value community, friendship, and compassion -- like our Kiwanis group -- the more aligned my actions are with my values. The richness I find every Tuesday morning will not change my checking account, but may change the person I am, and the father I will be.

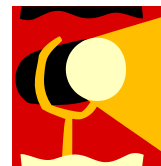
