PNW DIVISION 22 **CAPTURE THE FLAG**

Objective of Game: To Capture the Divisional Flag with the most points. (Interclub Challenge)

Rules: The Divisional flag cannot be captured until all clubs flag in Division 22 are captured.

Each club captured flag is worth 200 points for a possible total of 800 points, Divisional flag 300 point.

Flag cannot be captured until the following requirements have been met:

Edmonds— 3 members

Once the requirement to capture the flag the following bonus points can be earned:

Each member above requirement: 20 points

Member's first interclub: 50 points

New Member (less than a year) 75 points

Visiting club must make a request to capture the flag after each member has been introduced and declare any bonus points that should be awarded. A member from the visiting club shall designate a representative to go in front of delegation and perform the traditional Div. 22 handshake. The flag may then be presented and given to the club representative.

Once all Club flags have been captured, they must be brought to a Divisional Council Meeting to capture the Divisional Flag. Club with the most points will be awarded a banner patch with the "Hats Off" trophy.
